

But you must submit a plan that accurately shows the property line, so if you don't know where this is, getting a survey is something to consider. And don't forget to speak with your neighbor before digging that first fence post hole. Your neighbor may think the property line is located elsewhere... so talking now could prevent a problem later!"

ROAD PROJECTS COMPLETED

On-Time & Under Budget

he Township completed the 2019 Road Program in early August – on schedule and \$67,000 under budget! This year's program repaired and resurfaced more than 2.7 miles of Township-owned roads – a significant investment in our community's infrastructure. And that doesn't include the many smaller fixes made by our Public Works team throughout the year!

The Township will soon begin to prepare a list of roadways for possible repair or resurfacing in 2020. We'll carefully review our entire roadway network (all 56 miles!), assess any damage caused by winter storms, and prioritize improvements as conditions warrant.

Additional information on the 2020 Road Program will be published in the Winter newsletter.

t a public meeting in June the Township's appointed auditor presented and discussed the audited financial statements for 2018. The auditor found no problems or other concerns, and noted that audits conducted in recent years were given similar clean bills of health.

The auditor also highlighted the Township's conservative approach to budgeting, which has produced consistently reliable revenue and expenditure projections. In 2017 Worcester Township received the Governor's Award for Local Government Excellence for its annual budget.




WAR COMES TO WORCESTER 1777 SUNDAY, OCTOBER 6, 11AM TO 3PM

WHO'S KNOCKING

oor-to-door sales in Worcester Township are allowed by permit only. To obtain a permit all solicitors must provide photo identification, complete a criminal records check, and abide by certain regulations in the Township Code.

Solicitors must also carry their
Township-issued permit at all times, and
make it available to property owners.

Worcester Township lists active solicitation permits on the front page of our website, worcestertwp.com. If someone selling in your neighborhood is not listed on our



website, call the Township Building at (610) 584-1410.

Please note that local governments can't require religious organizations, political candidates and certain non-profit advocates to obtain a permit... as the courts have ruled that doing

so violates free speech. But property owners have the final say as to whether any solicitor is allowed on their properties. So consider posting a "no solicitation" sign on your front lawn or near the front door if you want to stop commercial and non-commercial solicitors from interrupting dinner.

HAPPY BIRTHDAY COMMUNITY HALL!

Worcester Township Community Hall turns 100 years old in 2019. Some folks think Community Hall, located on Valley Forge Road in Fairview Village, is a former one-room school house, but it isn't. The building, then known as Assembly Hall, was constructed by the Fairview Village Assembly, a community organization established to promote agriculture and sociability. In the years that followed Assembly Hall hosted a wide variety of events, from civic meetings and community suppers to square dances and family reunions.

The Township purchased the building in 1983. Today, public meetings are held at Community Hall, and the basement level is home to Boy Scout Troop 133.

This is a perfect opportunity to safely and responsibly discard used motor oil, old bottles of weed killer, and Dallas Cowboys jerseys. Both events are from 9am to 3pm, and are free for all Montgomery County residents (business and industrial wastes are not accepted).

VOLUNTEER FIREFIGHTERS HOURS LOGGED

hrough the first six months of 2019, the men and women of the Worcester Volunteer Fire Department logged 3,102 hours conducting drills and responding to calls for help. If these folks were paid firefighters, the estimated cost to Worcester taxpayers for the same number of service hours would total about \$331,900.

And if the Township were to employ a full-time paid fire department this cost would top \$2 million per year, or about \$180 for each person now living in Worcester!

Our volunteer firefighters may not be paid, but maintaining a dependable volunteer fire department isn't free. The Worcester Volunteer Fire Department is always looking for persons who can help protect our community. MAKING CENTS

aving taxpayer money, it's one of the things Worcester Township does best! Here's another example of a step we're taking today to keep our financial position secure tomorrow.

WHAT WE DID ...

We chip downed branches and branches delivered to the Township's compost bins, and we use the mulch at select off-road trails.

THE DETAILS...

We take great pride in our efforts to keep our parks and trails looking great. Mulched areas not only look great, but also help to control the spread of noxious weeds and other invasive plants. The Township uses the mulch it chips to resurface the Heyser trail, the Moran Trail and other naturalized areas throughout the parks system.

HOW MUCH WE SAVED ...

Most commercially purchased mulch costs between \$30 to \$40 per cubic yard. By making and spreading our own mulch, our cost is about \$9 per cubic yard. This saves taxpayers approximately \$3,900 each year.
