104-Acre D'Lauro Property Permanently Preserved

If you travel on Valley Forge Road from Lansdale to Lower Providence, you know you can tell the difference when you're driving through Worcester. Housing developments and large shopping centers give way to the farm fields and meadows that are the hallmarks of Worcester's heritage as an agricultural community.

Thanks to the vision and generosity of long-time resident Frank D'Lauro, who passed away in February 2006, over 100 acres of fields, woods, and meadow along Valley Forge Road will remain as open space forever. During his years on Worcester's Planning Commission,

Frank constantly worked to preserve open space in Worcester. His final legacy to his community was the preservation of his own 104-acre farm along Valley Forge, Stump Hall, and Water Street Roads, which was accomplished through his will. According to Frank's wishes, 60 acres of his farm will be owned and managed by Natural Lands Trust as a preserve that will be open to the public. It will feature walking trails through fields of warm-season grasses. The rest of the



property will remain in private ownership. All of the land will be protected by conservation easements held by Montgomery County Lands Trust. This will insure that these fields, woods, and headwater streams of the Zacharias Creek will remain as open space forever.

Frank chose to preserve his land through bequests in his will, leaving it to his executor and cousin, John D'Lauro, to work with the land trusts on the specifics of preservation. This method of preservation allows a landowner the freedom to change his mind, but assures that the land will be preserved if the landowner owns it when he dies. In exchange for this freedom to change his mind, the landowner gives up the opportunity to realize income tax benefits from donating a

conservation easement during his lifetime. However, a bequest in a will still qualifies the estate for estate tax benefits when the executor donates a conservation easement on behalf of the deceased landowner.

Reminders from the Building & Code Department

Along with over 90% of the state's municipalities, Worcester Township chose to administer and enforce the statewide building code, called the Uniform Construction Code (UCC), in June, 2004. The regulations require an extensive and time consuming review of plans for additions, new construction, and various home improvements by the Township Building inspector. This allows the home owner, and their insurance company, to rest assured that the quality of the construction, and the improvements, is



to minimum statewide standards. In some cases Worcester is stricter than the minimum, but we do not allow substandard construction in the Township as defined by the code. One of the advantages of having a uniform construction code within the township is allowing the fire department to be prepared to fight fires, knowing that construction codes were followed, minimizing risks for all involved. 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The Benefits of Rain Barrel Installation

What is a rain barrel?

A rain barrel is a small scale conservation practice that collects and stores stormwater runoff from rooftops. By temporarily holding the stormwater runoff during a rain event, you can help add capacity to the sanitary sewer system and reduce sewer overflows to our creeks and streams which are a source of our drinking water. Also, the collected rainwater can be reused for irrigation to water lawns, gardens, window boxes, street trees or even car washing.

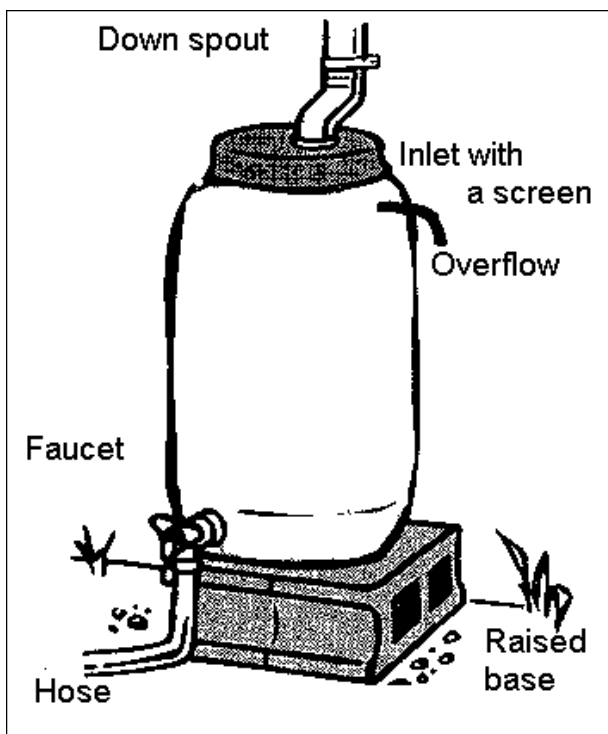
Why use a rain barrel?

Residential irrigation can account for 40% of domestic water consumption in a given area. This can be a problem particularly in summer, when the majority of outdoor water use occurs, and also the time when there is likely to be a water shortage. Collecting rainwater from your roof during storms by using a rain barrel can not only lower your water bills, but also help to decrease water demand during the hot summer months. Rainwater collection and reuse is beneficial to the environment because the stored water would otherwise run off into the storm sewers, bringing pollutants such as oil and grease, bacteria, and nutrients with it. Once water gets into a storm sewer, it eventually ends up in our streams and rivers. Also, the more rainwater that is reused, the less need there is for chlorinated or chemically treated tap water.

Where can I get one?

You can purchase a rain barrel at most major lawn and garden centers. Call your local center to see if they sell them or if they can order a rain barrel for you. Or, you can make your own rain barrel using a large trash can, agricultural supply container, or other large container and a little ingenuity. Barrel sizes typically range from 50 to 250 gallons. How do I install a rain barrel?

Most rain barrels are easy to install; however, actual installation methods may vary depending on the individual brand of rain barrel. Installation of a typical barrel will involve disconnecting your downspout, cutting off a portion of the downspout and redirecting it into the top of the barrel. Most rain barrels have an overflow pipe that redirects the rainwater back into the downspout or onto your lawn or other surface in the event the barrel becomes full. Other features may include safety features, spigots, connector barrels, mosquito proofing, and even water filters. Always be sure to empty your barrel before winter comes so you don't end up with a barrel full of ice!

Worcester Township Storm Drain Marking Program

If you have recently been for a walk in the Sunnybrook development, located off North Wales Road, you may have noticed a new addition to the storm sewer inlets. Thanks to a local boy scout, Phil Maniscalco, Worcester has begun the process of applying these markers to stormwater inlets. As part of an EPA mandate, the purpose of these markers is to help protect our waterways by reminding and educating residents of the importance of our stormwater systems. These inlets collect rain, ice and snow water, ultimately taking it to our streams, rivers and lakes.

Please be careful with trash, pesticides, animal waste, leaves, automotive fluids and other pollutants. These contaminants not only clog up stormwater pipes, potentially leading to floods, but can cause significant damage and death to watershed animals and plants.

was hired in 2006 to provide a fully accredited inspector. Keystone Municipal Services provides this type of service to 38 municipalities in 6 counties in Pennsylvania. By outsourcing this service the township is able to expand the professional services it has access to, bringing in experts in all types of construction, including commercial and residential, on an as-needed basis. We now have coverage during vacation times and are assured that our inspectors have certifications that are current.

Our current building inspector, Russ Davis, has been with Worcester for over a year and is committed to making sure that the safety of our community is not compromised. The Township requires a permit for new construction and various other home improvements. A complete list of jobs that require permits can be found on our web page under "General Information." Once a permit has been applied for and the plans have been submitted, Russ reviews them to make sure they comply with the relevant portions of the UCC. When the permit is issued, you are assured that the plans meet the state-wide code. The Township then has the inspector visit the construction site at a scheduled time, to make sure that the contractor has performed the construction according to the plans. While this may seem like a lengthy process, it can solve problems for both the current and future homeowners. And the state requires it. While all this seems at times to be a hassle for everyone involved, including the township, it eliminates problems now for the homeowner and in the future for any future owner or contractor. Building inspections can be stressful and we ask that you understand we are not trying to strain anyone's patience, but simply making sure that we are a safe, well-built community which follows the construction codes, as defined by the state.
