2020 Budget Adopted

**No New Taxes, No Tax Increases
Per Capita Tax Eliminated**

The 2020 Budget, adopted by the Board of Supervisors on December 18, includes no new taxes and no tax increases, and maintains the higher-quality services and programs our community enjoys today. The Budget also eliminates the Per Capita Tax, a tax that, in past years, was levied in the amount of \$1 per non-student resident age 18 and older.

The current Township real estate tax, at 0.05 mills, is the lowest municipal millage rate in Montgomery County. This means that the owner of a property in Worcester Township that is assessed at \$400,000 pays \$20 in property tax to the Township.

The Budget funds more than \$900,000 in road improvements (to keep roads safe), provides a 5% increase to the Township's contribution to the Worcester Volunteer Fire Department (our community's all-volunteer emergency service provider) and replaces important Public Works equipment (that have reached the end of its useful life).

The Budget provides a one-half percent (0.5%) increase in residential and commercial sewer rates in 2020. For residential customers the sewer rate will increase by about \$0.22 per month.

VALLEY FORGE ROAD CORRIDOR IMPROVEMENT PROJECT

If you've ever been stuck in traffic on Valley Forge Road – waiting at an intersection for the car in front of you to turn – help is on the way.

Worcester Township recently received a \$700,000 grant from the Pennsylvania Department of Community and Economic Development to design significant improvements to Valley Forge Road, between the intersection with Woodlyn Avenue and the intersection of Township Line Road and Stump Hall Road.

In specific, these improvements include:

- widening this portion of Valley Forge Road to create a center-turn lane;
- creating left-turn lanes onto Township Line Road and Stump Hall Road;
- installing a new traffic signal at Woodlyn Avenue, and creating a left-turn lane onto Woodlyn Avenue;
- creating separate right and left-turn lanes exiting Woodlyn Avenue; and,
- upgrading the existing traffic signals at Water Street Road and Township Line Road/ Stump Hall Road.

The improvements will enhance safety along Valley Forge Road, which is one of the heaviest-travelled roadways in our community. In addition, the improvements will allow vehicles to travel this roadway as efficiently as possible.

It is important to note that, at this time, this project involves improvement design only. After the plan of improvements is designed and approved by PennDOT (Valley Forge Road is a State-owned road), the Township will seek additional Federal, State and County dollars for construction. Construction is estimated to cost \$12 million.

The Township Traffic Engineer has begun to design the improvement plan. The grant will pay for all design costs. The plan is expected to be completed by year's end. 🚧



Ask Mary Ann

When the telephone rings at the Township Building, and the resident on the line asks a question, Receptionist extraordinaire Mary Ann always has the answer. Here's one of the questions that Mary Ann often fields, and her answer...

RESIDENT: "Does Worcester Township regulate hunting?"

MARY ANN: "No. The Pennsylvania Game Commission enforces hunting regulations throughout the Commonwealth. In addition, State Law prohibits local governments from enacting firearm regulations of any kind, and townships and boroughs that do this can be sued in Federal Court."

Days Gone By

General George Washington and his troops twice encamped in the Township in October 1777. Soldiers occupied a property near the intersection of Skippack Pike and Bethel Road. The location was chosen because it offered long and unobstructed views in several directions, providing ample notice of a surprise attack by British forces.

2020 Sewer Fees

Residential and commercial sewer fees for properties connected to the Worcester Township sanitary sewer system will increase by one-half percent in 2020. For residential customers the fee will increase by about \$0.22 per month, to \$132.05 from \$131.40 per quarter.

The new rate will be reflected in sewer bills to be mailed on April 1, for service provided in January, February and March.

ROAD IMPROVEMENT PROGRAM

This year Worcester Township will continue implementation of its annual road improvement program. This program is designed to maximize the useful life of infrastructure through an aggressive maintenance plan and appropriately-scheduled capital improvements. The program allows the Township to maintain more than 59 miles of roads in good condition.

The maintenance plan includes pothole repair, street sweeping, roadside brush trimming, roadside swale maintenance and patch milling.

The capital plan includes the replacement of culverts and stormwater pipes and the resurfacing and reconstruction of roads. On average, the Township resurfaces and/or reconstructs between three and five miles of roadways each year.

The number of roads treated depends on many factors, including the extent of repairs needed, the cost of materials, and the damage done during the winter months. As such, road projects are often subject to change.

At this time projects proposed in 2020 include the repaving of:

- Artmar Road;
- Berks Road;
- Credley Lane;
- Ernest Lane;
- Ethel Avenue;
- Morris Road; and,
- Old Orchard Road.



When the list of roads to be resurfaced is confirmed this information will be posted to the Township website.

Motorists using the above-noted roads may experience delays during construction. We thank folks for their understanding and patience as we work to improve our community's roadways. 🚗

COMPREHENSIVE PLAN UPDATE



The Worcester Township Comprehensive Plan serves the primary planning guide for our community. The Comprehensive Plan helps to guide growth and land preservation, natural resource protection, traffic management, infrastructure improvement, the provision of utilities, fiscal sustainability, and other issues that affect our community.

State Law requires every municipality to review its comprehensive plan every ten years, and Worcester

Township has started this process. In January the Board of Supervisors appointed a 17-member Task Force to prepare and recommended updates to the plan. The Task Force will meet throughout the upcoming months, and forward its recommendations to both the Planning Commission and the Board of Supervisors.

When a municipality updates a comprehensive plan, public input is critical. All meetings of the Task Force, Planning Commission and Board of Supervisors are open to the public. All residents are strongly encouraged to attend one or more meetings, and to share their thoughts about our Township's future. The Task Force meets on the fourth Wednesday of each month, and the Board of Supervisors and Planning Commission meet on the third Wednesday and fourth Thursday of each month, respectively.

"WHO GETS THE PROPERTY TAXES THAT I PAY?"

It's a question we often receive at the Township Building, because the collection real estate taxes can be a little confusing. So here's the skinny...

A real estate tax bill includes three separate taxes... the property tax that's levied by the county, the property tax that's levied by the school district, and the property tax that's levied by the municipality. Each entity has a different tax rate, so each entity receives a different percent of the total taxes paid.

So who gets the property taxes that are paid by property owners in Worcester Township?

88.7% goes to the **Methacton School District.** School districts usually have the highest tax rate.

11.2% goes to **Montgomery County.** This includes the County's community college tax.

0.1% is collected by **Worcester Township.** Yes, our property tax rate is really that low! 🐶

Recycling Ideas "hold the anchovies"



Pizza boxes are made from cardboard, so they must be recyclable, right? Not necessarily. Cardboard that's soiled by grease and cheese is not recyclable.

When paper products are recycled they are mixed with water and turned into a slurry. Grease and cheese cause oil to form, and when this oil attaches to the paper fibers, the entire batch of slurry is ruined.

So enjoy a slice, then tear out any soiled portions of the pizza box before recycling.

VOLUNTEER FIREFIGHTERS HOURS LOGGED

In 2019 the men and women of the Worcester Volunteer Fire Department logged **5,832 hours** conducting drills and responding to calls for help. If these folks were paid firefighters, the estimated cost to Worcester taxpayers for the same number of service hours would total about **\$629,000**.

And if the Township were to employ a *full-time* paid fire department this cost would top \$2 million per year, or about \$180 for each person now living in Worcester!

Our volunteer firefighters may not be paid, but maintaining a dependable volunteer fire department isn't free. The Worcester Volunteer Fire Department is always looking for persons who can help protect our community. SUBDIVISION AND LAND DEVELOPMENT UPDATE

The following projects are now under review:

- Mazz Properties - A two-lot single family detached home subdivision at Morris Road.
- Meadowood - Two generator units to service an existing retirement community at Skippack Pike.
- Palmer - A subdivision of seven commercial lots and one residential parcel at Skippack Pike and Valley Forge Road.

The following subdivision and land development projects are among those receiving approval in the recent years, and construction has not yet begun:

- Meadowood - A 4,200 sf addition for administrative offices and resident amenities at an existing retirement community at Skippack Pike.

- Sparango Construction - An eight single-family detached home subdivision on Berks Road.
- Stony Creek Village - Office, retail and restaurant buildings at North Wales Road & Township Line Road.

The following approved subdivision and land development projects are now under construction:

- Meadowood, The Grove - A 52-unit age-restricted development at an existing retirement community at Skippack Pike.
- Reserve at Center Square - A residential subdivision at Skippack Pike that includes 125 townhomes and 125 single-family detached homes.
- Whitehall Estates - A 39 single-family detached home subdivision on Whitehall Road. 🗓️
