



Days Gone By

To provide public transportation from Norristown to Worcester, Skippack, Lederach, Harleysville, and Souderton, a sixteen-mile-long trolley road was incorporated in 1902, as the Souderton, Skippack and Fairview Electric Railway Company to run from Trooper to Souderton and came to be known as the Montgomery County Rapid Transit Company and finally as the Montgomery County Traction Company.

It never reached Souderton. There was little resistance to the building of this line, but it was the slowest built in the County. The first car left Main and Swede Streets, Norristown to Center Point on July 20, 1907. The line to Skippack was not completed until July 4, 1908. Harleysville, only four miles farther, was not reached until 1912. Residents fondly called it the "Wogglebug." The service was discontinued in June 1925 after a car ran into an open switch and launched into another car, which put both cars out of commission.

WORCESTER TOWNSHIP OPEN SPACE PRESERVATION PROGRAM

The Board of Supervisors has launched an Open Space Program that aims to permanently preserve at least 300 acres of land by 2033, the Township's 300th anniversary. When achieved more than 20% of the Township's total land area will be preserved forever... that's one in every five acres!



The Board of Supervisors also created a program that matches private donations made to open space preservation efforts. The Township will match every dollar contributed, up to \$300,000 per year, with all funds held in a special account dedicated for open space preservation. Turn Around, Don't Drown

Some motorists approach road-closed signs and think, "I don't see anything dangerous, so I'll keep driving down the road." It's a decision that can cost lots of money, and lives.



Did you know...

- six inches of flowing water will knock the strongest person off their feet;
- six inches of water can cause a car to lose traction; and,
- twelve inches of water will float most cars.

In Pennsylvania drivers who are caught disregarding road-closed signs are assessed two points on their driver's license and a fine up to \$250. This fine increases to \$500 if the vehicle gets stuck and requires emergency rescue services. So before driving around a road-closed sign, think twice about the risks. It's just not worth it!

Branch Drop-Off Location- Nike Park!

The branch drop-off site at Nike Park, 1575 North Trooper Road, just south of Potshop Road will be open two days a week, Wednesday and Saturday, from 10am to 2pm from March-October. The location will be open on Saturdays from 10am to 2pm (except when there is holiday, the drop-off will be Wednesday) from November-February.

The Township chips tree branches and makes the mulch available to Township residents at no cost. The mulch, and other materials, are available for pick-up at the compost bins that are located near the Public Works Building 24/7 and at Nike Park during hours of operation. Please note the mulch must be self-loaded.

WORCESTER RECEIVES GOVERNOR'S AWARD For Local Government Excellence

Worcester Township is pleased to announce the Township has received the 2022 Governor's Award for Local Government Excellence for Fiscal Accountability in recognition of its work to create a fiscally sustainable sanitary sewer system. The award was presented to the Worcester Township Board of Supervisors Chairman Rick DeLello by C. Kim Bracey, Executive Director for the Governor's Center for Local Government Services, at a ceremony held at the State Museum of Harrisburg on April 13th.

In the Fall of 2015, the Township's Sewer Fund was depleted, and system expenses were being paid by the General Fund. At that time Township officials implemented a plan of action that included:

- conducting a "top-to-bottom" review of all expenditures and receipts;
- establishing a minimum fund balance policy to be respected at all times; and,
- maintaining a reserve account that fully funds the system's long-term capital improvements.

Today, the Sewer Fund has a balanced annual operating budget of approximately \$700,000, and possesses a capital reserve fund in excess of \$2,000,000.

Equally impressive, the Township's sanitary sewer fee has increased by less than 1.0% each year for the last five years. The increase for 2022 was only 0.5%, or 22 cents per month for each single-family home connected to the system.

The Worcester Township sanitary sewer system serves more than 1,000 homes and businesses. The system includes two wastewater treatment plants, seven pumping stations, and approximately twenty miles of sewer mains.

2022 Road Improvement Program

This year, Worcester Township will continue implementation of its annual road improvement program. This program is designed to maximize the useful life of infrastructure through an aggressive maintenance plan and appropriately-scheduled capital improvements. The program, which includes a maintenance plan and a capital plan, allows the Township to maintain more than fifty-five miles of roads in good condition.

The maintenance plan includes pothole repair, street sweeping, roadside brush trimming, roadside swale maintenance and patch milling. The capital plan includes the replacement and installation of culverts and stormwater pipes, and the resurfacing and reconstruction of roads. On average, the Township resurfaces and/or reconstructs between three and five miles of roadways each year.

This summer the following roads will be resurfaced:

- Adair Drive
- Doe Brook Road
- Heebner Park Parking Lot and Trail
- Hollis Road
- Markley Avenue
- Methacton Avenue
- Mount Kirk Park Parking Lot and Trail
- Plumlyn Avenue
- Reichenbach Road
- Shefley Lane
- Slough Road

The work is scheduled to get underway in June, and will conclude by late-August, weather permitting. Motorists using the above-noted roads may experience delays during construction. The Township thanks residents for their understanding and patience as we work to improve our community's roadways.

TIPS ON WAYS TO CONTROL STORMWATER ON YOUR PROPERTY

Here are some tips from the Penn State Extension to consider when you trying to control the stormwater on your property:

- **Downspout Disconnect/Redirect** - If your downspouts are directed onto a paved or concrete surface or are directly connected to the storm drain system, look for opportunities to redirect them to lawn and garden areas. Just be sure that all downspouts are directed away from foundations to avoid basement flooding.
- **Rain Barrels** - Rain barrels capture and hold water until it can be used or slowly released into planted areas. For rain barrels to be effective at controlling stormwater, it is important to have a plan for using the water before installing one.
- **Planting Trees** - Planting trees are a great way to reduce stormwater runoff. If you have a stream on your property, planting trees along the stream can be the best thing you do for water quality and the trees will help prevent the stream from eroding away your property. The more trees the better, but aim for a band of trees that is at least 35 ft. wide. At the very least don't mow your lawn directly up to the edge of the streambank. Let the grass grow some roots!
- **Meadows** - If trees aren't an option on your property, adding other types of plants is a good substitute. Any areas where lawn can be replaced with ornamental grasses, flowers, and shrubs will have a positive impact on controlling stormwater on your property. Meadows, whether large or small, increase the ability of the land to absorb water. Meadows can be a great way to reduce the amount of time you spend mowing the grass and can be placed in the areas that are the most difficult to mow.
- **Rain Gardens** - One of the best options for managing stormwater on your property is to install a rain garden. A rain garden is a bowl-shaped garden that can capture and hold water until it is able to be absorbed into the soil.
- **Pervious Pavers** - Pervious pavers can look very similar to a traditional brick or stone patio, sidewalk, or driveway. The difference is that they are installed with a thick stone base that provides space for water to be stored until it soaks into the ground. They are great for converting hard surfaces that usually make a lot of stormwater, into a surface that absorbs, manages, and reduces stormwater runoff. 🌿

Volunteer Firefighters Hours Logged

In first quarter of 2022, the men and women of the Worcester Volunteer Fire Department logged **2,511 hours** conducting drills and responding to calls for help. If these folks were paid firefighters, the estimated cost to Worcester taxpayers for the same number of service hours would total about **\$271,188**.

And if the Township were to employ a *full-time* paid fire department this cost would top \$2 million per year, or about \$180 for each person now living in Worcester!

The Worcester Volunteer Fire Department is always looking for persons who can help protect our community. - Clean your grill after each use. This will remove grease that can start a fire.
- Place the coals from your grill in a metal can with a lid once they have cooled.

RECYCLING LEAF & YARD REGULATIONS

Last year, the Worcester Township Board of Supervisors adopted Ordinance 2021-286, which enacted recycling requirements, specifically leaf and yard waste, in order to make sure the Township is fully compliant with recycling requirements as mandated by Pennsylvania Department of Environmental Protection (DEP) for municipalities with populations over 10,000.



Your trash hauler is required to have a monthly curbside collection of leaf and yard waste. The leaf waste should be bagged in biodegradable bags in order to be picked up. Some haulers may accept branches and other yard waste items. The Township has placed the information received from each of the trash haulers that service our community and the schedules for the monthly curbside collection on our website.

Subdivision & Land Development Update

The following projects are now under review:

- Haganir – An eight-lot single-family detached home subdivision at Artmar Road.
- Palmer – Seven commercial lots and one residential parcel at Skippack Pike & Valley Forge Road.
- Palmer Village – An eleven-lot single-family detached home subdivision, with a bank, convenience store, and pharmacy, at Skippack Pike & Valley Forge Road.
- City View – A 180-unit apartment complex at Germantown Pike and Park Avenue.

The following subdivision and land development projects are among those receiving approval in the recent years, and construction has not yet begun:

- Bethel Development Associates – A two-lot single-family detached home subdivision at Skippack Pike.
- Gunsalas Tract – A three-lot single-family detached home subdivision at Mill Road.
- Meadowood – A 4,200 sf addition for administrative offices and resident amenities at an existing retirement community at Skippack Pike.
- Sparango Construction – An eight-lot single-family detached home subdivision at Berks Road.
- Stony Creek Village – Office, retail, and restaurant buildings at North Wales Road & Township Line Road.

The following approved subdivision and land development projects are now under construction:

- Meadowood – A 20-bed memory care facility at an existing retirement community at Skippack Pike.
- Reserve at Center Square – A residential subdivision at Skippack Pike that includes 125 townhomes and 125 single-family detached homes.
- Whitehall Estates – A 39 single-family detached home subdivision at Whitehall Road.


